Both the words and the music to the hymn "At the River" (No. 375 in our hymnal) were composed by Robert Lowry, a Baptist pastor, in 1864. The tune later caught the attention of two prominent American composers, Charles Ives, and Aaron Copland. The later included "At the River" in a collection titled "Old American Songs." He later gave his former student, Raymond Wilding-White the job of expanding the vocal line to SATB choir, while keeping Copland's characteristically simple yet expansive piano accompaniment. Copland, who's music perhaps more than any other composer seems to capture in its melodies and the openness of its harmonies the optimism and possibility of the American spirit. It's a musical style that seems ideally suited for this beautiful text, based in part on Revelation 22:1, a foretaste of the crystal clear river of water of life flowing from the throne of God. This arrangement has been sung on many occasions, including the memorial concerts for Copland and Leonard Bernstein.

There is some mystery around the author/composer of the text and tune of our opening hymn, "How Firm A Foundation." Several names have been suggested as the authors. During the American Civil War, both Northern and Southern soldiers could be heard singing it; a testament to how God bridges the gap between all peoples.

TIME with CHILDREN

The tune of our second hymn was adapted from an African American Spiritual melody by Henry Thacker Burleigh. Henry's maternal grandfather, Hamilton Waters, paid \$55 for his and his mother's freedom in Maryland in 1832. Hamilton sang plantation songs to his grandson Henry, passing on the music that Henry would later make known around the world in his work as a singer and arranger. When he arranged the tune for "In Christ There is No East or West," Burleigh named it "McKee" after Elmer McKee, the rector of St. George's Episcopal Church in New York City.

Many composers throughout history have set the "Prayer of Saint Francis" to music. It's perhaps not surprising that the "Prayer of Saint Francis" has tempted many composers throughout history to write musical settings. The text is warm, aspirational, hopeful, and invites musical settings. René Clausen is an acclaimed American composer and choral conductor. Clausen's setting employs shifts in voicing, accompaniment and harmony to paint the affect of sections of the text.

SCRIPTURE LESSON Romans 8:35-39

The composer of the hymn tune "Charlestown" is unknown. The tune first appeared in print in The United States Sacred Harmony, 1799, a collection compiled by Amos Pilsbury, a silversmith, schoolteacher, and clerk in the Presbyterian Church. Many subsequent compilations of hymns (Wyeth's Repository, Kentucky Harmony, Tennessee Harmony, and others) were influenced by Pilsbury's 1799 publication.

In What Torn Ship

Daniel E. Gawthrop, born 1949 in Fort Wayne, Indiana, is an American composer, primarily of choral music. "In What Torn Ship" comes from a collection of two unaccompanied choral motets. It is a setting of a text by John Donne, the English writer and Anglican cleric who is now considered to be the preeminent metaphysical poet of his time. He was born in 1572 to Roman Catholic parents, when practicing that religion was illegal in England. His work is distinguished by its emotional and sonic intensity and its capacity to plumb the paradoxes of faith, human and divine love, and the possibility of salvation. This composition was a favorite of former longtime music director, John Lintner.

Quiet and relatively short in duration, Clausen's "Set Me As s Seal" has become a 20th century choral classic, often selected for performance at contests and festivals. The piece emerged out of deep tragedy and loss. After three miscarriages, the composer, René and his wife were expecting and all was proceeding well, until a doctor's mistake during a routine procedure at 6 1/2 months caused the death of their child. René went home and poured his grief onto the page, composing this motet in about 20 minutes. Based on the poetry of Song of Solomon, describing the love between Christ (the Groom) and His bride (the church) as a love that will stand fast when the tides of sorrow overwhelm. The music, with is softly clashing dissonances and gently unfolding melodies, paints a serene and tender picture of love in Christ, strong and living, even in the midst of pain, sorrow, and even death.

PRAYER of DEDICATION (*The Romero Prayer*)

As with all of the hymn tunes we sing today, the composer of the tune Beach Spring is not known. The tune first appeared in 1844 in a collection of tunes called "The Sacred Harp." Though it first appeared set to the text "Come ye sinners, poor and needy" the tune, perhaps owing to the memorable singability of its melody has been used to set dozens of different texts. In our own hymnal, it appears three times to different texts.

◆ BENEDICTION

Copland, in seeking to establish a uniquely American voice in his compositions, turned to the wellspring of American folk music. He drew ideas from a wide variety of sources, including cowboy music of the West, Mexican dance hall rhythms, and the music of various American religious traditions. "Zion's Walls" originated as a camp meeting song in Georgia, first notated and published in 1855 by John G. McCurry. It became part of the tradition of Southern folk hymnody known as "shape note." In Copland's search for American folk music, he found a book that included "Zion's Walls" and he incorporated it, first into his second set of "Old American Songs" (1952) and then his opera "The Tender Land" (1954). In this time of heightened conflict between Palestine and Israel, there is understandable sensitivity around the word "Zion" and its modern meaning. The original authors of this text, writing forty plus years before the establishment of the modern Zionist movement, invoked the metaphor of Zion as a broad and inclusive invitation to all people to sing praises and imagine a future in the Promised Day of God.
